

Bear River Divide 2020

The Bear River Divide Hunter Management Area is open August 15 – March 1 to hunt sage grouse, waterfowl, rabbits, antelope, deer, elk, moose, and mountain lion during specific species seasons as published in the current Game and Fish Commission Regulations and with the following limitations:

- **Each hunter** must have a **permission slip** and a **vehicle pass** to the specific hunter management area and the species they are hunting. **Anyone without Department permission shall be subject to trespass charges.**
 - Permission slips are unlimited in number and available online from the Wyoming Game & Fish Department
- Non-hunting/non-permitted persons may assist in game retrieval on the hunter management area as long as they are accompanying a permitted hunter and do not possess a firearm.
- Hunting is by foot and horseback only.
- Motorized travel is allowed on **established roads ONLY**. **Watch for “Road Closed” signs! However, closed roads may be used for game retrieval only between the hours of 10 a.m and 2 p.m.**
- **Possession or use of Off Road Vehicles or commonly called “ORVs, ATV’s, UTV’s, side by sides, four wheeler, dirt bike, etc”, as defined by Wyoming Statute 31-1-101, is prohibited.**
- Leave all gates as found.
- Abide by all signs and posted areas.
- **Keep off of oil and gas sites.**
- Camping and campfires are allowed on private lands unless posted otherwise.
- **Respect the ranches by packing out your trash and not littering.**
- Do not shoot in the direction of livestock, buildings, roads, windmills, stock tanks, or any object other than the animal you are hunting.
- Do not damage fences, range improvements, or harass livestock. Livestock has the right of way.
- Do not tamper with or damage any signs, posts, or other regulatory markers.
- **Report any wildlife violations 1-877-WGFD-TIP (1-877-943-3847).** Future hunting opportunities depend on hunter compliance with all ranch rules as well as Game and Fish laws and regulations.
- If you harvest an animal on deeded land, leave the landowner coupon in the boxes along the main roads or mail the coupon to the ranch where the animal was harvested.
