

## **Gray Wolf Management Monthly Update for March 2013**

*Note: Information in this update is intended to highlight the month's major wolf management actions and is not intended to be a comprehensive detailing of all management activities. Information in this update is draft and subject to change as details from the field become available. Finalized annual reporting of this information will be published in the annual wolf report available in April on the Wyoming Game and Fish Department's website.*

### **Verified Wolf Killed Livestock**

- Verified that two or more wolves had killed a Hereford calf on private lands in Teton County, Wyoming.
- In an unrelated incident, verified that wolves had chased and harassed cattle on private lands in Teton County, Wyoming.

### **Research and Monitoring**

- Large Carnivore Management Section personnel are in the process of finalizing data for the 2012 end of year minimum estimates for the number of wolves and breeding pairs in Wyoming. All wolf monitoring and management information will be reported in an annual report that will be available to the public in April 2013.
- Population monitoring from the air and the ground continued throughout March.

### **Wolf Management (Captures, Relocations, and Removals)**

- Nothing to report.

### **Law Enforcement and Related Activities**

- Wyoming Game and Fish Department game wardens are looking for information about the illegal killing of one gray wolf in the North Fork of the Shoshone River near Cody between February 15th and 19th. The department requests the public's help with this investigation. Anyone with information about this incident should call Wyoming's Stop Poaching hotline at 1-877-WGFD-TIP, report online at [wgfd.wyo.gov](http://wgfd.wyo.gov), or call Wildlife Investigator Irah Leonetti at 307-527-7125. Those with information can remain anonymous and may be eligible for a reward. Help protect Wyoming's wildlife: "Stop Poaching – Help Us Stand Watch."

### **Outreach and Education**

- The Wyoming Game and Fish Department in cooperation with the Wyoming Animal Damage Management Board produced a brochure titled "Wolves in Wyoming: A guide for livestock producers" to provide guidance for livestock producers who experience damage to livestock caused by wolves.
