



Camp Creek Wildlife Habitat Management Area


Comprising of approximately 150 acres, this wildlife habitat management area is in the southwest corner of the Gros Ventre Range off U.S. Highway 189. This is historic elk winter range and more than 2,000 elk winter here. Damage to haystacks on adjacent property prompted the establishment of feedgrounds on this area. More than 1,000 tons of hay are required to feed elk each winter.

Meandering streams, steep slopes, timbered ridges and scattered meadow bottoms provide rich habitat for many bird species. More than 35 species of birds have been identified in this area. Grosbeaks, hummingbirds, swallows and tanagers are the most common species.

The land within and surrounding this area is crucial winter habitat for more than 75 moose. A herd of about 40 bighorn sheep also finds much needed habitat on the rocky grasslands between Stinking Springs and Hoback Junction. The land adjacent to this area provides sufficient food for blue and ruffed grouse and black bear.


Little and Big Horse creeks support populations of cutthroat and brook trout. Fishing in these creeks is fair. Excellent opportunities also exist for hiking, photography, and wildlife viewing. Public access is not available by vehicle.

This area is closed each year from December 1 through April 30.
